JBS Five Rivers- History

- Late 1920's. Warren H. Monfort began farming north of Greeley, Colorado
- 1930. Mr. Monfort became a pioneer in quality cattle feeding by utilizing crop surpluses
 - Mr. Monfort was the first in the industry to provide quality fed cattle to packing plants year- round
- 1940 1968. Monfort feedlot grew from 3,500 head
 - into the world's first 100,000-head feedlot - Warren Monfort, and his son Kenneth, expand the
 - operation into meatpacking in 1960 They pioneering the movement of beef processing plants from urban consumer areas to the sources of cattle

JBS Five Rivers- History

- 1969. Cimarron Feeders and Colorado Beef built
- 1970. Gilcrest Feedlot constructed
- 1972. Coronado Feeders, Hartley Feeders and XIT Feeders built
- 1974. Kuner Feedlot and Grant County Feeders opened
- 1987. Continental Grain Company purchased Cimarron Feeders
- 1987. Yuma Feedlot constructed

JBS Five Rivers- History

- 1975 1997. Continental Grain acquired:
 - Hartley Feeders
 - Cimarron Feeders
 - Grant County Feeders
 - Colorado Beef
 - XIT Feeders
 - Coronado Feeders
- 1987. Monfort of Colorado sells to ConAgra Foods
 - Company continued operations as ConAgra Red Meats IOC
- 2000. Continental Grain Company forms ContiBeef LLC as a subsidiary.

JBS Five Rivers-History

- 2002. Swift and Company began operations
 - Feedlots financed by ConAgra
 - Report to Swift and Company
 - Interstate Feeders became part of this entity
- 2004. Swift returned control to ConAgra
- 2004. ConAgra sells to Smithfield Beef Group
 - Operations continued as MF Cattle Feeding

JBS Five Rivers- History

- 2005. Five Rivers is formed
 - Six ContiBeef feedyards owned by Continental **Grain Company**
 - Four Smithfield Beef Group feedyards owned by Smithfield Foods, Inc.
- 2008. JBS acquires Five Rivers Ranch Cattle Feeding LLC from Smithfield Foods and Continental Grain Company.
