Trade Issues in the Beef Industry

On June 16, 2017, Gregg Doud was nominated by President Donald Trump to be Chief Agricultural Negotiator, with the Rank of Ambassador, in the Office of the United States Trade Representative. Mr. Doud currently is the President of the Commodity Markets Council. Prior to that, he was a Senior Professional Staff member of the Senate Agriculture Committee for Senators Pat Roberts and Thad Cochran. He assisted in crafting the 2012 Senate Farm Bill and his portfolio of issues included international trade, food aid, livestock, and oversight of the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC). He is a native of Kansas and is a graduate of Kansas State University with degrees in animal science (BS) and agricultural economics (MS).
